Featured Department: Floor Plans

The Floor Plan Department secures funding for dealer purchases from as many as 40 different lenders each week.

Banks and Finance Companies provide some of the funding but the majority comes from sources such as

Ford Motor Credit, GMAC, Chrysler Financial, etc. Our department is staffed by three full time employees. Janet Patterson, Debra Carney and Jennifer Woods. We also have help each week from some of the part time employees who also work the counter and title mail out other days of the week. "Outside" floor plans account for almost 25% of the working cash at this auction. We ask the dealers to sign in each sale day so we know that they are here and, if needed,

can get a daily dollar availability for their company. After the sale is over, we check to see if they have purchases for that day, make sure that they are within the guidelines of their floor plan company, such as year, miles, or sometimes even specific makes.

We then make sure that their availability is enough to pay for all purchases.

Some of the information is then sent to the financing company by electronic transmission. Reports are built in the computer and with the push of a button or two, we can request millions of dollars at a time. If a company is not "set up" for transmission, the fun starts. The copy machines become our best friend! Rebecca Couture, (thank you more than we can say for all your help) is the very best friend to the copier. After all the paperwork is in order, we either fax or Airborne required documents to each company. Some pay by check and some by wire. Everything not transmitted, is paid in the system, just like depositing a check, and titles are mailed out by our department or title mail out. Floor plans are hectic and crazy, but in the end, the challenge lets us know that we can do anything!

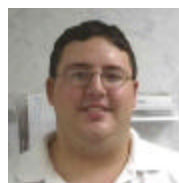
The Limo department has 4 new drivers: Alan Foraker, David McNulty, David Mathison, Tim Faircloth and

Beth Graves as office clerk. We would like to welcome each of them aboard. Also a big welcome back to Verne Riggall.

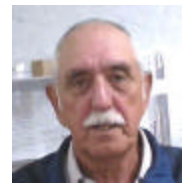

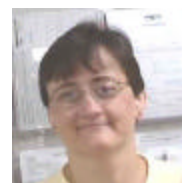

‘GMAC, please don’t CHASE me all over TOWN & COUNTRY because it really HERTZ’. (sounds like hanky panky to me.)

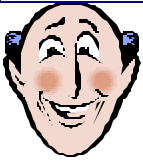
“Hey, SPYDER, you still think you can outrace the JAGUAR? That would be the story of the CENTURY.”

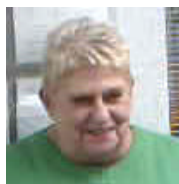

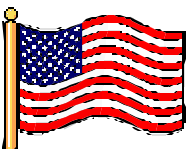
pated In the relay will be June 5th, time and location to be announced.

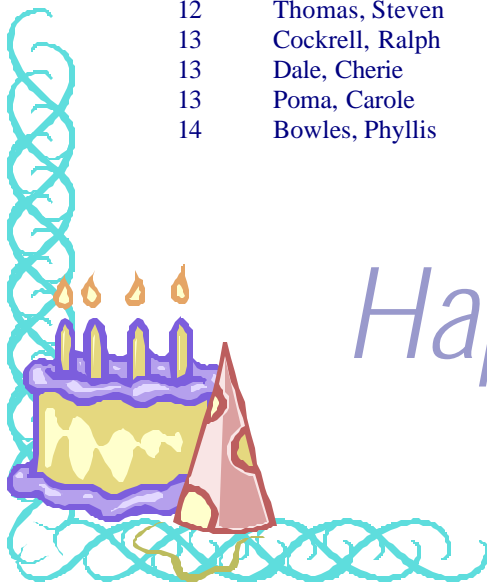
hand-made the first American flag, which is exhibited at the Betsy Ross House in Philadelphia.

The Safety Zone

How to Prevent Back Pain

Your can do a great deal to prevent back pain. Always clear exercise plans with your physician.

Difficulty Level: average

Time Required: varies

Here's How:

Warm up before any exercise or sport.

1. Take breaks from activities.
2. Use a lumbar cushion in your car and at work if you sit a lot. This cushion is approximately 15" high by 20" wide and curves to fit the back.
3. You can also roll a towel and tuck it behind the small of your back (below ribs).
4. Start each day with gentle stretching exercises.
5. A simple exercises program can prevent injuries. Your doctor or physical therapist can show you exercises that are good for you.
6. Go through your house, office, and other surroundings looking for dangers to your back. Watch for damaged flooring, furniture placement, traffic patterns, throw rugs, items set on the floor, toys, etc.
7. Don't be a weekend warrior. If you sit at a desk all week, your back will not respond well to sudden strenuous activity like rock climbing, skiing, etc.
8. Take lessons to learn the proper way to play sports.
9. Know your limits and stay within them when it comes to lifting, reaching above your head, playing sports, and all activities involving back movements.
10. Make sure all stairs and steps are well-lit and solid -- esp. those going to the basement. Provide hand rails for all steps.
11. Make sure all ladders are steady and set solidly before climbing them.
12. Always wear your seat belts. If you are petite, auto supply stores have clasps that will keep the shoulder strap from choking you.
13. Do not stand on concrete floors without a rubber mat.

Back Pain Exercises

Exercises to minimize problems with back pain

You can minimize problems with back pain with exercises that make the muscles in your back, stomach, hips and thighs strong and flexible. Some people keep in good physical condition by being active in recreational activities like running, walking, bike riding, and swimming. In addition to these conditioning activities, there are specific exercises that are directed toward strengthening and stretching your back, stomach, hip and thigh muscles.

Before beginning any exercise program, you should discuss the program with your doctor and follow the doctor's advice. It is important to exercise regularly, every other day. Before exercising you should warm up with slow, rhythmic exercises; if you haven't exercised in some time, you can warm up by walking. Inhale deeply before each repetition of an exercise and exhale when performing each repetition.

Exercises to strengthen your muscles

Wall slides to strengthen back, hip, and leg muscles



Stand with your back against a wall and feet shoulder-width apart. Slide down into a crouch with knees bent to about 90 degrees. Count to five and slide back up the wall. Repeat 5 times.

Leg raises to strengthen back and hip muscles



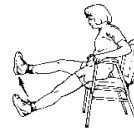
Lie on your stomach. Tighten the muscles in one leg and raise it from the floor. Hold your leg up for a count of 10 and return it to the floor. Do the same with the other leg. Repeat five times with each leg.

Leg raises to strengthen stomach and hip muscles



Lie on your back with your arms at your sides. Lift one leg off the floor. Hold your leg up for a count of 10 and return it to the floor. Do the same with the other leg. Repeat five

times with each leg. If that is too difficult, keep one knee bent and the foot flat on the ground while raising the leg.



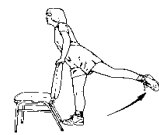
You can also sit upright in a chair with legs straight and extended at an angle to the floor. Lift one leg waist high. Slowly return your leg to the floor. Do the same with the other leg. Repeat five times with each leg.

Partial sit-up to strengthen stomach muscles



Lie on your back with knees bent and feet flat on floor. Slowly raise your head and shoulders off the floor and reach with both hands toward your knees. Count to 10. Repeat five times.

Back leg swing to strengthen hip and back muscles



Stand behind a chair with your hands on the back of the chair. Lift one leg back and up while keeping the knee straight. Return slowly. Raise other leg and return. Repeat five times with each leg.

Exercises to decrease the strain on your back



Lie on your back with your knees bent and feet flat on your bed or floor. Raise your knees toward your chest. Place both hands under your knees and gently pull your knees as close to your chest as possible. Do not raise your head. Do not straighten your legs as you lower them. Start with five repetitions, several times a day.



Stand with your feet slightly apart. Place your hands in the small of your back. Keep your knees straight. Bend backwards at the waist as far as possible and hold the position for one or two seconds.

The Story Behind A Most Famous Hymn

There is usually a story behind any written song or hymn. Here's one about a very famous hymn I believe most people are familiar with. John Newton wrote this hymn about 224 years ago and it's still as popular as ever.

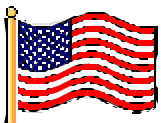
John Newton, as a child, had a very close relationship with his mother. She died when he was 7 years old. He was very distraught over the loss. His life alternated between boarding school and

the high seas. While in the British Navy, he deserted but was captured after 2 days. Still grieving, he contemplated suicide. On the night of March 9, 1748, he was jolted awake by a brutal storm that had not been foreseen by his ship's crew. It was a traumatic and life-changing experience for him. It awakened and strengthened him spiritually, which led him to life in the ministry. John Newton became one of the most powerful preachers in British history.

He also authored hundreds of hymns and the one I speak of is one of his most famous. It is played and sung in churches and at special ceremonies honoring our fallen military heroes. You may have heard it on the news and "seen" it, especially a Scottish bagpipe rendition of the hymn on TV or at a parade – you probably guessed it – "Amazing Grace" (written in 1779). And now you know the rest of the story.

The History of Flag Day

The Fourth of July was traditionally celebrated as America's birthday, but the idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the Flag is believed to have first originated in 1885. A Wisconsin schoolteacher arranged for his pupils to celebrate June 14 as Flag Day.

In 1891, the Betsy Ross House in Philadelphia held a Flag Day celebration.

Private citizens were urged to display their flags on June 14, and children were given small flags.

In 1894, the governor of New York directed that on June 14 the Flag be displayed on all public buildings. On June 14, 1894, the first general public school children's celebration of Flag Day was held in Chicago with over 300,000 children participating. Adults were also urged to participate by the Secretary of

the Interior who said the flag had spoken to him: "I am what you make me; nothing more. I swing before your eyes as a bright gleam of color, a symbol of yourself."

Flag Day was officially established by President Woodrow Wilson on May 30, 1916. But it was not until 1949 that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14 of each year as National Flag Day.

Cookin' In The Kitchen

BANANA CREAM PIE

1 chocolate graham cracker crust (6 oz.)
 1 pkg. instant vanilla pudding
 1 envelope whipped topping mix
 1-1/2 cups cold milk
 1/2 tsp. vanilla
 2 medium bananas, sliced crosswise
 In a mixing bowl, combine pie filling, whipped topping mix, milk and vanilla. Beat at slow speed on electric mixer until blended. Increase speed and beat until very thick, about 3 minutes. Pour 1/3 of the mixture into the crust. Layer slices of banana on top, reserve 1 sliced banana for garnish. Pour remaining filling into the crust. Place reserved banana slices over the filling. Chill 2 hours. Add whipped topping just before serving.

GARLIC SHRIMP LINGUINE

1 pound uncooked linguine
 1 tablespoon butter
 3 tablespoons white wine
 2 teaspoons grated Parmesan cheese
 3 cloves garlic, minced
 1 teaspoon chopped fresh parsley
 salt and pepper to taste
 1 pound medium shrimp, peeled and deveined
 Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add pasta and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente; drain.
 In a medium saucepan, melt butter over medium low heat; add wine, cheese, garlic, parsley and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer over low heat for 3 to 5 minutes, stirring frequently.
 Increase heat to medium high and add shrimp to skillet; cook for about 3 to 4 min-

utes or until shrimp begins to turn pink. Do not overcook.

Divide pasta into portions and spoon sauce on top; garnish with Parmesan cheese and fresh parsley, if desired.

STRAWBERRY PRETZEL SALAD

2 cups crushed pretzels
 3/4 cup butter, melted
 3 tbsp. white sugar
 1 (8oz.) package cream cheese, softened
 1 cup white sugar
 1 (8oz.) container frozen whipped topping, thawed
 2 (3 oz.) packages strawberry flavored gelatin
 2 cups boiling water
 2 (10 oz.) packages frozen strawberries

Preheat oven to 400 degrees
 Stir together crushed pretzels, melted butter and 3 tbsp. sugar, mix well and press mixture into the bottom of a 9x13 in. baking dish. Bake 8 to 10 minutes, until set. Set aside to cool. In a large mixing bowl, cream together cream cheese and 1 cup sugar. Fold in whipped topping. Spread mixture onto cooled crust. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir in still frozen strawberries and allow to set briefly. When mixture is about the consistency of egg whites, pour and spread over cream cheese layer. Refrigerate until set. Makes 12 servings.

GAZPACHO

1 can tomato soup
 1 1/2 cups tomato juice
 1 1/4 cups water
 1 ea garlic clove, pressed
 1/4 tsp salt
 1/4 tsp pepper
 2 tbsp olive oil

1/8 tsp garlic salt
 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
 1 tbsp Italian dressing
 1 tbsp lemon or lime juice
 1 cup chopped cucumber
 1 cup chopped fresh tomato
 1/2 cup chopped bell pepper
 1/2 cup chopped Spanish onion
 1/4 tsp hot pepper sauce
 2 tbsp red wine vinegar

Combine all ingredients. Chill at least 6 hours.

BASIL PESTO BREAD ROUNDS

1 (1 pound) loaf French baguette
 2/3 cup mayonnaise
 1/3 cup basil pesto
 2 cloves garlic, minced
 1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
 salt to taste

Preheat oven on broiler setting. Arrange bread slices in a single layer on a cookie sheet. Place under broiler for 5 to 8 minutes, or until lightly toasted on one side. Watch carefully to ensure they don't burn. Remove from oven, and flip bread slices so that the toasted side is on the bottom.

Set the oven temperature for 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). In a small bowl, mix together mayonnaise, pesto, garlic, Parmesan and salt. Spread evenly over untoasted sides of bread slices.

Bake in the preheated oven for 6 to 8 minutes. Set the oven to broil, and place the rounds under the broiler just until they begin to bubble and turn golden. Let cool slightly before serving.

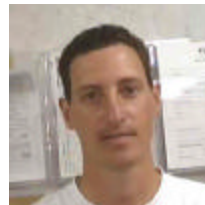

Transportation Department we have Leslie Faircloth, she is the daughter-in-law of ML Faircloth, Maintenance Supervisor.

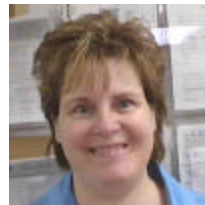

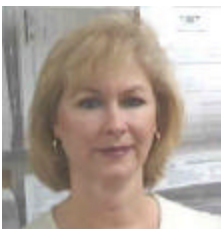

The only information I can get out of Jay is his black Lab is black.

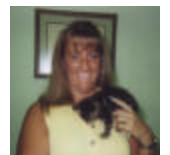
Now we come to the really serious pet people in our Department, Janet Mooneyhan and Anna Dubell.

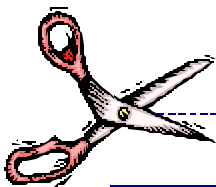
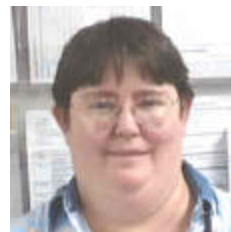
